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# Aloha Message

Five years of my life in a lovely, rainy, and green town of Kaneohe will be soon pau (finish). I am very surprised at the



fact that I am now writing my aloha message to the Jushin readers. As you may know, I am going to resign from my position and move back to Japan in December. Thank you to those who have helped me and also always encouraged me through past years. Without your support, I would not have been able to accomplish my work in

Kaneohe.



I came to Hawaii as a minister in 2012. I still remember the day I arrived in Honolulu. I was welcomed with a beautiful bouquet of flowers

delivered by a Kaneohe

Higashi Hongwanji member. I was quite amazed and happy by the warm hospitality. But then, very soon after my arrival, my crazy busy days began... my transition to the Hawaii Betsuin and Kaneohe temples. Since a Betsuin minister was leaving at that time, I had to do quick learning to cover the two temples. What a responsibility for the newborn minister! Now, it is very difficult for me to recall my transition in those days—lots of note taking, meeting new people, and agonizing over my poor English.

Even though I experienced various things which I would probably never have had opportunities if I stayed in Japan — dharma-talks at Sunday services, monthly

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visitation at the daycare centers, and exciting Bon Dances — I wish I could have done more for the temple members and especially the Kaneohe community. As I recall my life here, one passage comes across to my mind, "learning Buddhism is very simple. It is 'to perceive the fact that there is a human being right in front of you.' Indeed, it is the awareness of that

there is a human being who is living in the middle of suffering, struggling, or various difficulties just like the way that you live. Through the realization, we are awakened to the truth of life that others and we live in the world of interconnectedness." From the viewpoint of the Buddhist teaching, there is no absolute existence of "the I" in the world. My body is nourished by food, and my mind is nourished by experience

and teaching. "The I" can be changed as conditions change. Thus, Shakyamuni Buddha spoke metaphorically that a net is made up of a series of knots, and each of knot (a single person) cannot be an isolated thing. Although I understand this funda-

mental teaching of Shakyamuni Buddha in my mind, the above passage reflects my way of life here in the temple. As I go through my bubbling thoughts and memories of Kaneohe, I truly appreciate those who taught me the importance of connecting with one another beyond nationalities, races, gender, and differences. Also, thank you to all the dharma friends for sharing your precious time to learn and listen to the teachings of Namu Amida Butsu together.

Last but not least, I want to express my sincere ap-

preciation for everyone's warmth and kindness, your AlohaAmida spirit that always embraces me. It has been my pleasure working at the Kaneohe Higashi Hongwanji and being part of the sangha for such a short period of time. Thank you very much for all your help.

A hui hou... Namu Amida Butsu.








### No Better Word Than Aloha

## Annual Meeting Sunday, January 29, Service and New Year's Party to Follow


