New Year's Greetings from Bishop Hiroshi Tajima, Chief Administrator

I wish to extend my warmest New Year's greetings to all of you in the overseas districts. My name is Hiroshi Tajima and I have been assigned as Chief Administrator of the Shinshu Otani-ha as of the end of last year.

Since we have finished the renovation project of the buildings at the Shinshu Honbyo by observing the Commemoration Service of the Completion of the Renovation in November last year, we must now move ahead towards the 850th Anniversary of Shinran Shonin's Birth which will be celebrated together with the 800th Anniversary of the Establishment of Jodo Shinshu in 2023.

As the new Chief Administrator, I will carry on the wish of the former Bishop Koi Sato'o, who strongly encouraged us to open up a new horizon for our entire denomination in preparation for those major events.

I realize the huge responsibility I have just assumed. I wish to ask all of you in our overseas districts for your continued support of our denomination.

On the occasion of the New Year, I asked myself, "What is the spirit of the Shinshu Otani-ha?"

My response was that it is the aspiration to create a sangha based on the teaching of the nenbutsu, just as Shinran Shonin expressed in the postscript of the Kyogyoshinshu, "Those who are born earlier guide the succeeding generations and those who are born later learn from those who precede them."

Right at this moment, there are always intensifying conflicts in areas around the world. Those conflicts are caused by such attitudes as self-justification, and placing blame on others.

As long as our minds are bound by differences in nationality, culture, and religion, those horrible incidents will never subside. Because we live in such a world, it is even more important for us to revive the spirit of the nenbutsu sangha where anyone can live together

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Spring Ohigan Service March 5

You and your family are cordially invited to attend Kaneohe Higashi Hongwanji's Spring Ohigan, March 5 at 9 AM. Our special guest speaker is Rev. Clarence Higa who has an interesting background and message.

The Most Reverend Clarence Shinko Higa grew up near downtown Honolulu, attended McKinley High School, Leeward Community College, and the University of Hawaii. He then journeyed to Japan, lived four years as a monk at Shinnoin Temple on Koyasan, Wakayama Prefecture. He is ordained as a Shingon Buddhist Priest and upon

Higan-e services are observed twice a year during the spring and autumn equinoxes. "Higan" literally means "the other shore," the world of Enlightenment, namely, the Pure Land, while our daily world is called "this shore." Higan is the abbreviation of "to-higan" which means "reaching the other shore." Ohigan gives us a good opportunity to reflect on the Dharma, which can lead us from "this shore" of our world to "the other shore" of Buddha's Enlightenment.

Bishop Ken Kawawata observed Kaneohe Higashi Hongwanji's 2017 General Membership Meeting held at 9AM on

January 29. Shortly afterward, he officiated the Sunday Service.

In his dharma message, the Bishop expressed the district's "deep appreciation" for the Kaneohe Higashi, its members, and 'ohana who have supported the Kaneohe temple and also the Hawaii District temples during the past year.

Likewise, our temple has benefitted from Bishop Kawawata's support through the years. He has trekked over the Koolau mountains to officiate the last Sunday service of each month, shared insightful dharma messages, and facilitated

dialog sessions.

Moreover, during our temple's current transition between Rev. Hiroko Maeda's return to Kyoto and the arrival of a new minister, he has provided full support as we maintain our mission to members and the community.

Also in his dharma message the Bishop shared the concept that some people possess a primal desire to revisit the home they grew up in, and there they may recall familiar sights and scents that say, "Ahh, this is my home!"

He said people also need a primal "spiritual home" in order to live a fuller, more meaningful life. Such a spiritual home could be the temple, "where teaching of the dharma is practiced, where our hearts may go to (in times of strife)." The temple can also be a "physical place where we might take refuge, attain peace and harmony in our mind as we seek truth," the Bishop explained.

Dr. Conway is also an ordained minister of the Shinshii Ótani-ha (Higashi Honganji).

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Chairperson's Notebook

Happy New Year and Aloha, Members and 'Ohana:

During 2016, my first year of being the Chairperson of our Kaneohe Higashi Hongwanji Mission, I have been developing an overwhelming sense of humility and gratitude for the many people in our Sangha people who come to the temple, who rise to the aid of the temple either by volunteering to repair or improve our 53 yearold structure and grounds, who plan and implement activities, and even the many quiet ones who dutifully keep this humble place beautiful day after day.

I'll be "up-and-up" with you. Even though I have been involved with many temple events and major projects for maybe 15 years and served as the Board's Vice Chairperson for a year, I appreciated the Sangha - as a member of the Sangha.

voting board members. At this moment we have two vacancies to fill and we will have another vacancy in May. I am inviting and encouraging anyone interested in working together with us as a board member to apply. It's an excellent way to foster, enhance and perpetuate our Jodo Shinshu Dharma.

Let me also say with admiration that our Sangha has been carrying on religious services since mid-December, and, as needed, receives the gracious help of our Hawaii District ministers. Thank you everyone!

This strong need of our Sangha to gather to hear the Dharma traces its roots to the founding of our original temple in the 1920s when Kaneohe Fukyujo - the precursor to the establishment of our temple - did not have a resident minister and the Higashi Betsuin would send a minister over for our service.

How enlightening and rewarding it is for me today to experience our Sangha carrying on. I myself officiated a Sunday Service (my first!) on January 15 as a lay member. I can attest that our Sangha 'Ohana keeps our temple going.

In greeting 2017, let's continue to join together as a Sangha to seek the Dharma.
