Greetings from our new minister

Aloha! After waiting for six months because of this unusual time, we finally got to Kaneohe!

I'm Marcos Jinen Sawada your new minister, 56 years old, with my wife Norma and my son Nathan. Since February 1st I am the official resident minister of Kaneohe Higashi Hongwanji.

I came to Hawaii eight years ago as the minister of Hilo Higashi Hongwanji. Before living in Hawaii, I lived in Japan and in Brazil, the country I was born. I graduated at Sao Paulo University Physical Education College where my major was Physical Education. I also have studied Buddhism at Doho University in Nagoya Japan, the former Takeo Maeda Sensei's hometown. I have taught at different levels from elementary age to college students and adults. I taught Portuguese language, Japanese and subjects related to physical education. I have also been a fitness instructor, personal trainer and professional soccer coaching staff. I have worked as a Brazilian government general consulate worker also, business owner, translator and interpreter, massage therapist before finally settling as a minister.

When I was a child, I lived in several temples in Brazil, because my parents both were ministers for more than 40 years there. They had a really hard life spreading Buddhism in a country where 80% are Catholics, but they never gave up. My parents have been taking the Buddhism life as the most important thing for them. I saw their hard life on that ministry and I used to think to myself, "I'll never become a minister in my whole life!" But, in this life things happen and I cannot explain or deny what I'm doing here now.

Now a new start, I wish to grow together with you as a human being receiving your warm encouragement on this new path as your minister.

In Hilo I could realize my Hawaiian roots. When I would look up at the Mauna Kea mountain from the Hilo Higashi parking lot I would see that stunning view which used to make me feel one with the land, invoking in me a deep feeling of involvement in this Hawaii world!

The Hawaiian melodies I listen to when I drive, usually on Sundays and holidays bring me nostalgic feelings of the people of this land, the gorgeous nature and their relation with it. So hard to express, only the tears coming from my eyes can testify my pride in being part of this wonderful land and people.

Dharma message

Time to come to Kaneohe, a place where there is nice rain, beautiful mountain views and warm people. Kaneohe and Hilo both being in Hawaii, doesn't impact me as dramatically as if it were going to another country or culture. But we have anxious feelings of how it will be in a new place, what kind of feelings people in Hilo had about us or what the Kaneohe temple is expecting from us. Of course, these feelings are only our ego trying to make us appear to being impressive persons, hoping to make a difference to have people revere us.

This is an illusion I've created in my mind's expectation or reminding me that the concepts are being created because of my background. Actually, they are only the illusory span of time as the future and the past! Because of the memories in my mind which are associated with my emotions, they protected concepts as the past and the future. They create sensations of experiencing till the next new experience replaces the older ones. So, I am really not sure about my experiences as truth. I don't know and I want to know, both are an attempt to bring answers to my anxieties.

"I don't know and I want to know" actually means the same thing expressed in different words. They really just mean that I don't know and I'm not sure about it!

Master Shinran in his anxieties realized there are three kinds of faith (belief) to make us realize the immediate truth working: a) the true reality or ultimate reality, the dharma reality, AS IT IS (SHISHIN); b) The second I encounter from my spiritual experience "I believe (SHINGYO), the belief that this truth is without doubt and, C) the third is the belief that I can be born in the Pure Land or can be saved by Amida Buddha (YOKUSHO GAKOKU)).

For Shinran, every one of these three faiths, is converged in SHINGYO, the feeling of telling me that without doubt I will be born in the Pure Land! In actuality it is this second kind of faith, SHINGYO makes me realized the work of the Dharma of my incongruence of going to "believe and don't believe constantly" that means the true reality is absent of this self, ego or what I want to be. It is empty (空 KU) or no substance.

Importantly, what this teaches us is the realization that we know we don't know. Then we awaken to our own ignorance right now! In my case I have learned about my "self" ...the reality is without this ego. In gassho,

We will livestream this event on the internet in order to comply with public health guidance. This will also enable us to share the theme of the event with people throughout Japan and around the world.

It is my sincerest wish that even though we are still living in difficult times, I will be united with all of you in the overseas districts in continuing to listen to the Dharma and work towards restoring and preserving the Shin Buddhist way of life.

In conclusion, I wish to ask for your continued support as we begin the new year.


