Master Rennyo tells us that the loved one's death reflects onto us to be more aware about our own death. Sincerely, I think even if I tried, I couldn't get it. But, when I went to the gravesite of one of my friends who passed away recently, while I was reading the Sutra, memories of him started to come and I cried without any self-control. Only feelings of sadness and memories of him like a slideshow were in my mind. The same thing happened when I was at the Columbarium of my father's niche: sadness, a feeling of loneliness and something guiding me into an introspective journey.

Even though I was thinking that ceremonies and symbols don't work as reality, the unexplainable symbols worked as the truth without me realizing by myself. Even that realization was working by itself on me.

I am the kind of guy who becomes excited about things from the point I consider right or wrong. So, I try to argue every time that I'm right. Such a posture very often takes me to confrontation with others because of imposing my position on them. My ignorance feeds some conflicts.

On this trip, I was very angry because something wrong happened and I had to pay almost \$800 extra from Honolulu to São Paulo. My eves every time stands as I'm right and others are wrong. This is the source of conflicts, my own ignorance. I expected everyone to follow me and it made me angry for most part of my trip, until my mother, who is 93 years old, asked me to ask my father and my father, who is*n't in this world, sent through my mother's mouth some light* to awaken me.

My mother talked to me very softly and politely telling me the origin of my suffering was believing every time that I'm right. Actually, I think listening to the Buddha is the way I

usually do to put myself in the path of righteousness. But I didn't realize it till my mother's mouth and my father's writing made me realize about the big hatred I was taking in this

Since those few words from my wise mom came, my trip became lighter even though I have been losing money. It made me realize my own ignorance, hatred and desires in trying to make things my way was the big source of my suffering.

Highlights from Shinran Shonin's Pilgrimage Tour

My husband and I were very grateful we were able to be part of this pilgrimage tour this past April in celebration of the 850th birthday of Shinran Shonin and the 800th anniversary of the establishment of Jodo Shinshu. Our 5-day bus tour was packed with seeing and learning about many historical sights which included where Shinran landed, lived during his period of exile and after he was pardoned. It was during this exile period of his life that Shinran was known to have deepened his understanding of the Nembutsu teaching and resulted in many of his major writings which included the Kyogyoshinsho (*The True Teaching, Practice and Realization of the Pure Land Way*).

ESHINNI MEMORIAL – On the 3rd day of our bus tour we visited the Eshinni Museum.

Eshinni was the foremost woman devotee of the Nembutsu. She was born in 1182 in Echigo, (Niigata prefecture). Shinran Shonin married Eshin-ni when she was about 30 years old in Echigo during the period that he was exiled from Kyoto. With the Nembutsu as the foundation in their family life, she was the mother of 6 children and eventually moved to the Kanto district together with Shinran Shonin. And together they were known to have widely spread the joy of living life to the utmost wherever they lived.

During her later years, she returned to Niigata alone, and in her letters from that time, she mentioned a five-tiered, seven-foot stone pagoda, known as "Toita-no-maki". It was reported that an excavation conducted there in August 1957 led to the discovery of a six-hundred year old magnolia tree, together with a stone pagoda matched what she had written in her letters. Hence, it was decided that this location in Niigata, as the memorial site dedicated to Eshinni. It was reported that she passed away in 1268; which would have made her 86 years old. Also at this site, a Kobushi Grove, which was her favorite blossom was designated in her honor.

FUTURE GENERATIONS AT THE HOBUTSUJI TEMPLE – We had a very nice visit at Bishop Kenjun Kawawata's beautiful family temple located in Mito. I was overcome with a sense of calmness and peace when I entered the temple grounds. The natural path led us to a beautiful, all encompassing temple grounds with a tranquil garden highlighted by an outpouring lavender wisteria trellis in full bloom, pristine hondo, meeting & tea rooms, and family burial grounds all located within the large temple property. From time to time we hear about how the family temples are passed down from generation to generation and in this case, it was so impressive to actually see how the generations have kept the temple alive, passed to the next generation within the same family. If I recall correctly, Bishop's older brother is the 27th generation in the family lineage to be entrusted with the historical Hobutsuji Temple. He has a son (which would be the 28th generation), and he also has a grandson who would become the 29th generation. So in keeping with the family temple traditions, it was so impressive to realize that the next two generations of ministers within the Kawawata family are already in place. Coincidentally, this is the same number of generations that the current Monshu title has been passed down, among the current Ohtani family. With my background in human resources, I couldn't help but think...what would our Hongwanji temples in Hawaii be like if we had the same practice in place; passing on our temple responsibilities from generation to generation rather than having to recruit ministers...I know, it's just a thought.

As I've expressed my appreciation to Bishop Kawawata, Rev. Okada, Rev. Toyoshima and Rev. Sawada in making this pilgrimage trip so enjoyable and enlightening; I hope the temple continues to offer this trip in the near future. In gassho,
